Dr. Brent Willock is President, TICP; Advisory Board member, International Association for Relational Psychoanalysis and Psychotherapy; faculty, Toronto Child Psychoanalytic Program and Institute for the Advancement of Self Psychology. 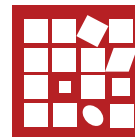
THE TICP

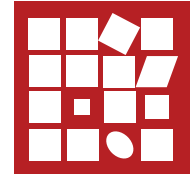

SYNOPSIS

This program applies the unique and prescient insights of Paul Russell to explore the critical relationships among attachment, affect, and repetition in the treatment of trauma. Our papers together consider Russell's understanding of inevitable and necessary patient-therapist impasses, what he called "crunches," and the embodied and relational affective conditions for negotiating them.

Russell wrote, "The repetition compulsion represents the scar tissue of the injury to the capacity to feel." The scar tissue is made up of repeated failures to grieve one's losses, and the price one has to pay for the absence or interruption of affective relatedness.

Paul Russell was an analytic supervisor, teacher, and dear friend of ours. His many extraordinary papers were popular and highly influential within the local Boston area. His work remained largely unpublished during his lifetime and has only recently become widely available through publication. In one brilliant mind, working to reconcile established theory with direct clinical experience, and restricted to no one school of thought, Russell bridged ideas in the true spirit of comparative psychoanalysis. Trained in the tradition of ego psychology, Russell taught the Freud course at two institutes and retained a historian's respect for the roots of psychoanalytic ideas, but his clinical sensibility led him to place affect at the center of human experience and thereby begin the articulation of a contemporary psychoanalysis.

It is no surprise that Stephen Mitchell found Paul Russell's ideas inspiring, original, and compelling. He asked us, "How can we get Paul Russell more involved with Psychoanalytic Dialogues?" Steve's wish was thwarted by Russell's untimely death in 1996. We regard it as a labour of love to continue to give voice to Paul Russell's contributions.
